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### **An History of Chorus**

In 1940 due to the Japanese invasion of South East Asia the production of shellac from the native Lac beetle all but halted. In turn, and partly due to the popular music industry not being deemed part of the war effort, the production of records ceased. Post war the greater availability of PVC allowed for a tighter band of grooves to be cut into it and proved cheaper than shellac as a material with which to make records. In 1948 Columbia Records released the first microgroove Vinyl 12 inch LP.

An History of Chorus contains the social, political, and religious development of our history from this point from the point of view of popular recordings. Supposing that one might be able to tell more about a particular culture by what it throws away, every record has been collected from charity shops, second hand shops, junk shops, jumble sales and so on. As an archive it can be used in various ways and for various means. The Miller and McAfee Press have catalogued the archive by the name of the choir singing on each recording and date it was performed, not by title or composer or the date it was copyrighted or re-released.

Each aspect of the archive holds inherent information of our recent history. From the re-releases and re-recording of older composers to the absence of particular types of music and the proliferation of others, a story, an history is there to be read.

### Important information when using the catalogue

When using this catalogue you will find that it has been compiled in alphabetical order of choir. For each entry there then follows a record title and record label are given. Finally a reference code will allow you to access the recording for purposes of closer inspection or to listen to it.

The code comprises two numbers, three letters, and a single number. The first two numbers refer to the date the recording was made, please note this does not always match with the date of the record's release or to the copyright dates. These numbers correspond to the numbers on the archive boxes in which you will find the recording.

The next three letters are the code for each choir archived, the recordings are stored in alphabetical order in their given archive box.

The final number is for identification purposes should a choir have recorded more than one record in any given year or should the archive contain more than one copy of the same recording, and are stored in numerical order.

Where no date has been ascertained the records are catalogued with an XX replacing the first two numbers of the code. Currently The Miller and McAfee Press are researching in order to obtain dates for these recordings upon which they will be re-catalogued and archived accordingly.

#### A note on playing the records

Some of the records are rare and in order to allow their use for many years to come, please handle the records in the archive carefully. Once you have finished listening to a record please replace it in the correct position.

## A discussion between The Miller and McAfee Press and Graeme Kay (BBC Radio 3) on a new piece of work titled 'An History of Choral Music'

GK – Briefly describe for me what the choral archive is.

MMP – This is an archaeological activity that we are undertaking here. There is an idea that you can tell more about a society by what it throws away than what it keeps. Our approach to gathering these records is that we buy them from charity shops or second hand shops and so on, and we buy any recording that has a group of people singing on it.

GK – It's interesting, I suppose the two main reasons people get rid of recordings are firstly that they die, having collected them over the years. And secondly people are changing carrier so they will dispose of their LPs because they've got CDs, or originally cassettes.

MMP – It's interesting you say that. When we've been looking for choral records we occasionally come across a box in which 50% of the records in them have got a green dot on them or something similar – you can tell they all belonged to the same person...

GK – ... yes somebody's catalogued them.

MMP – On some level both these elements are linked because on the one hand you've got a person dying and on the other a format becoming defunct, or dying out.

GK – Yes, I think there's a very interesting aesthetic point about the difference between CDs and LPs, the advantage of a CD over an audio cassette is the size of the packaging, the downside is that creatively the best sleeve art that exists was created for 12 inch LPs, and before it, the 78. I have commissioned, over the years, photographers who've worked in music, and they say that the biggest downside of their work with recordings is the fact that you don't have that big canvas to work on any more. I guess the same thing happens to graphic artists for whom designing attractive CD covers is the big challenge. But if you think about the Sergeant Pepper cover that Peter Blake did – he could not have done that if was working on the smaller format.

MMP: It does change completely though, because the CD affords you room for a small booklet inside which is something that can be played around with. In fact some of the records we've collected – box set records – some are still in mint condition an have a 12 inch booklet with it. This is immediately less throwaway than what you get inside a CD. It really has a presence.

GK: Well two things about CDs – the technical term for the plastic box that they come in is a jewel case, which I think is quite interesting because it's a comment about the added value of the CD as a found object because it is intrinsically beautiful. You look at it and it's got that reflective surface, all the colours of the rainbow and it's a very nice thing to have in a different kind of way from an LP. I grew up in the age of LPs and for me at college, and certainly collected them, as you were growing a collection of box sets it was definitely an aesthetic consideration. Books are furniture in the same way, box sets are furniture – CD's I find are a problem. They aren't quite furniture in the way that books are and they take up quite a lot of space. Such a lot of energy spent on CDs these days is trying to reduce the volume of even a CD – it is a compact disk – and so what you get is these folders where you chuck away the jewel case and you just put the CD and the booklet into a sleeve and you save even more space. It's hidden away, it's closed, and it becomes very much a library thing. You have here a sleeve...it's not like having it on an open shelf where you can look down, see what's there and know where everything is. But the thing about the LP and the way that LPs used to be displayed in shops is that they can only really be viewed in one way. The way to browse LPs is by flicking down them.

MMP: Yes and that's become quite a fetishistic activity. As records become less and less popular a lot of the releases don't really have them, but the vinyl record is still a physically desirable object.

GK: It's quite interesting; the iconography of the LP is so potent that some of the big classical record companies like EMI and Deutsche Grammophon have been re-releasing some of their classic recordings. Their back catalogue is endlessly being recycled because those recordings were originally made in the days when you could afford to take two weeks to record an opera. Whereas now it's so expensive that usually if they record operas, it's

live in the opera house. Since the early 70s a lot of money was being put into classical recording - it was being cross subsidised by other work these big companies were doing. Also, interestingly EMI have been making a thing of reproducing their LP covers on the CDs. They are saying to people these are classic recordings, vintage recordings, and this is what they looked like when they were released originally. A lot of CD buyers may not have even been alive when the LP originally issued is getting a taste of what that was like and what it actually meant to have these wonderful pieces of graphics. Deutsche Grammophon, the German record Label, have a thing called the Cartouche, the yellow label on the sleeve on which is the description of what's on the record. This is more than a trademark; it's a holy cow. For years the graphics department at DG almost kept it under lock and key; you could never publish a Deutsche Grammophon CD if it didn't feature the Cartouche. On the old LPs it would be all the way across the top and that was what people recognised – it was brand reinforcement. You knew when you saw the Cartouche that you were buying the highest quality, the greatest music by the best artists.

MMP – I suppose they're trying to reinvest in an idea of the history of music production and all the values that you associate with a particular period.

GK – As a record label Hyperion has attracted that collectable status for quite different reasons. Hyperion's stock and trade is an unusual repertoire. They are not trying to imitate what the big companies like EMI or DG are doing; they are trying to explore new areas of musical art, new artists. It too is always good music, highly produced, and the production values in the CD cover art are always very high. They tend to use old masters a lot but they've been very consistent throughout their 20-25 year history and this makes their output very collectable.

MMP – In *An History of Choral Music*, we've catalogued the records according to Choir. This is important to us and we feel this is an almost political act. It's saying that this is about groups of people coming together. Often the choirs appeal to us most are the amateur ones such as The Glasgow Orpheus Choir who were together for 50 years until their choir master retired and then they disbanded.

GK – I was reading up on this only last week actually. I got hold of a copy of 'Orpheus and His Lute' which is a collection of Sir Hugh Roberton's essays, articles, poems and Drawings from the magazine he published for the entire history of the choir. When he got in to his eighties and had to give up the choir they decided they couldn't carry on without him, or weren't prepared to go on without him. They have a perfect history, much of which is recorded, and then quit while they were ahead. I think they reflect something about this country.

MMP – Why do you think that is?

GK – It partly due to the Anglican tradition. Most communities in Britain have churches and these are places where people gather and sing and very often people get their initial training in singing in churches, as well as schools. This is not quite as strong in the Catholic Church.

MMP – Yes, Protestantism reinforced the idea of the common man singing along as part of the worship, whereas in the Catholic tradition the clergy sang to the congregation.

GK – It's sad but communal singing was actually treated with such great suspicion in ultra-Protestant traditions so there is a bit of a mixed message there but what the Catholic Church does have is the strong tradition in Gregorian chant, going back centuries. The human voice in something we all have; we can all sing whether we think we can or not. Traditionally in this country we've always banded together as amateurs to sing. Obviously there are professional choirs but not that many. It's a very widespread activity.

MMP – One of the interesting histories that has begun to emerge for us collecting these records is how the smaller, often secular amateur choirs are able to have a much more definable history. Like the Glasgow Orpheus Choir who had, as you say have a perfect history – a generation or two of singers together for 50 years and then nothing. The Choir defines a period in history. Whereas when you look at the Vienna Boys Choir for instance, their history spans a great range and the amount of time the boys will be able to sing with the choir is relatively short. So in a short space of time the Vienna Boys Choir will be made up of entirely different individuals – different voices. As far as our archiving is concerned they are all catalogued as same choir, but of course they're not, the choir has changed.

GK - Well, because boys' voices break, any recording of a church choir will include voices that have now

changed forever. It's a snapshot in time. Indeed if you look at the three volumes of *The Psalms of David* by King's College Choir, Cambridge in the archive, one of the interesting things about the progression of those three recordings is how the style of the choir changes over the period they're recorded in. In the first volume the boys sing in Received Pronunciation, all their vowels are flattened. By the time you get through to volume three their pronunciation is starting to sound a lot more normal. There is a cultural shift documented in those recordings. More recently, another thing that's happened is that choral music in this country has become a lot richer because of gospel choirs who perform to a very high standard bring in very different and refreshing elements that have crossed over into what the more traditional English choirs are doing.

MMP – Actually this is something that, in the archive, we have very little of. This is probably because we're collecting probably 10-15 years behind current trends. It seems to be a very conservative collection; Handel's Messiah seems to be in virtually every charity shop; it's the cannon, the piece you must have if you want to demonstrate your interest in choral music. Are there many surprises in the list of recordings we have collected in the archive?

GK – Apart from the odd rarity, virtually everything here is exactly what I'd expect to see. I'm pretty familiar with it because I probably bought quite a lot of it when I was a teenager. You have a lot of iconic stuff in here. I see you have some Music for Pleasure releases. MFP was one of the first cheap labels and Classic for Pleasure is a sub section of MFP, but these records are very resonant for collectors. EMI are now making quite a big thing out of re-releasing Classics for Pleasure.

MMP – We have a lot of compilations, particularly from the 70s, often in 'fantastic stereo', called things like Choral Favourites or something. Then there are the series like 'Classic Rock' where the kitsch angle is quite interesting and often the same choirs will be involved in these projects. The Royal Choral Society sung on Rock Classics and Rock Symphonies. As an archiving decision it's important to have them; that levels things out and removes the hierarchical standards of tradition. If it has a group of people singing on it then it goes in. The Kings Singers keep cropping up too and they're interesting because they seem to have started as a very highbrow choir early in their careers. They produced a beautiful record, called *The King's Singers Madrigal Collection*, with English Madrigals on one side and Italian on the other. Then later they recorded some folk songs and start getting into rock and by the end they have an airbrushed phoenix on their album cover and are backed by a funk band!

GK – Yes! They were on television a lot, in the days of the variety show, so they had a very broad listenership so they could afford to branch out.

MMP – So this wasn't their desperate attempts to revive a flagging career by becoming more popular?

GK – Well, no, when they were on the telly they were like a classical version of a boy-band really. Also they where unusual because they had two counter tenors and the general public hadn't had much experience of guys who sing high so they acquired a sort of cult status. The thing was that what they recorded was of the highest quality, they where vocal virtuosi. When they recorded something that was written in the renaissance, you could not only hear that they where competent musicians, but they also managed to make these complicated musical arrangements sound light.

MMP – In terms of the specific history of recording, as opposed to television etc., the archive illustrates an interesting. The archive begins with recordings from the late forties and they are on vinyl as opposed to the earlier shellac. The main reason for the limited availability of very early records was because of the war. Shellac production was all but halted once Japan had invaded South East Asia. This means that a lot of the old 78s are simply not in existence any more because of this and because you could cut a finer groove into vinyl they stopped using shellac after the war. You can draw a clear line across the history of marketed music because of this.

GK – Another important thing about the old way of cutting records is that you couldn't edit it because it was cut live into a master and people forget that audiotape only became available in the 50s. It was extremely expensive and I've been doing some work on Gigli, the tenor, recently and he is interesting because he spans the twentieth century history of recorded music. He started off making acoustic cylinders, progressed through 78s and he died in 1957 but was still recording in the early 50s and, although he was still recording on 78s, they were recording him in the background with audio tape. Because some of those tapes have now been made into CDs you can now hear how really sounded whereas on scratchy old cylinders and 78s, although the quality shines though, you don't

get the totality of the voice that you get with modern recording techniques. He just edged into the era of modern recording.

MMP – Singing in a choir must be and we think has to be seen as a social activity, do you agree?

GK – Singing in choirs is a very common experience, we have a strong tradition of this in England. It's the notion that anyone can join a choir and get a lot out of it even if you can't read music. I conduct a choir in Suffolk; some of them can read music and others can't but singing's an activity that can be learnt from others in a community situation, and that community is the choir itself. If you boil it all down what a line of music tells you is where the notes go and how long they last – it's not that difficult to get hold of because the basic rudiments of the theory of music are easy. You can learn these in a choir almost by osmosis; this is why it's such a powerful thing. I think it's worth looking at Estonia. The thing about Estonia is that there is a huge choral tradition, even bigger than here. It's as though every single person in that country sings and it's partly because choral community singing was a way of binding the nation together when the were under communism. It was a way of finding a freedom in music that couldn't be completely controlled.

MMP – We have examples of choirs in the archive that have obviously been formed by the State. Whether it is children's choirs, like the Budapest Children's Choir, or adult choirs, like the USSR Ministry of Culture Choir.

GK – One of the paradoxes is that communist governments have always valued the arts very highly and supported music. Look at the Red Army Choir; they were fantastic ambassadors for music, wholly supported by the state. But with places like Estonia it's rather different because they weren't wholly welcoming of soviet rule. Through choral music the country could sing and keep it's identity together as a nation within the Soviet Union. It would be quite difficult to find another way of doing that, which would involve everybody. So singing can be politically extremely powerful.
